- Mohamed Bouslimani as Minister of Communication.

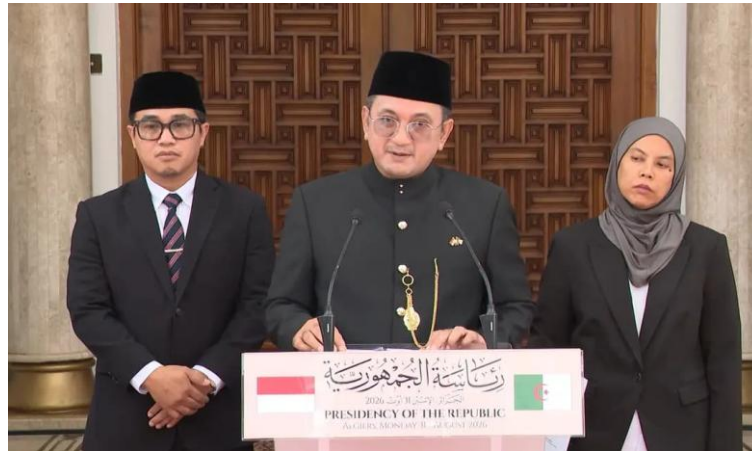
President Tebboune receives credentials of four new ambassadors

Algeria, Indonesia bound by shared history and anti-colonial struggle



The Ambassador of the Republic of Indonesia to Algeria, Mr. Yusron Bahauddin Ambary, emphasized on Monday that relations between the two countries are built upon deep-rooted historical ties, founded on a shared struggle against colonialism.

After presenting his credentials to the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, Mr. Ambary stated: "Relations between our two countries are not merely diplomatic ties, but a solid, deep-rooted historical brotherhood born of the shared struggle against colonialism."

He added that Algeria and Indonesia are united in "their firm commitment to standing with the Palestinian people in their quest for freedom and justice."

"In honor of this shared heritage, I pledge to strengthen the bonds between our two peoples—based on our common Islamic identity and anti-colonialist values—and to promote bilateral cooperation in the political, economic, social, and cultural spheres," the Indonesian diplomat continued.

After conveying the "warmest greetings" from his Indonesian counterpart, Prabowo Subianto, to the President of the Republic, Mr. Ambary offered "sincere condolences" to the families of the victims of the recent fires that affected various provinces across the country, underscoring his country's "unwavering solidarity" with the Algerian government and people during these difficult times.

Non-alignment, renewed sovereign choice dictated by profound global shifts

President of the Republic Abdelmadjid Tebboune emphasized on Tuesday that non-alignment is a renewed sovereign choice dictated by the profound transformations the world is undergoing, based on the principle that sovereignty is indivisible and that the application of international law cannot be selective.

In a speech read on his behalf by the Speaker of the People's National Assembly (Lower House of Parliament), Khalida Boufedech, during the high-level meeting commemorating the

65th anniversary of the First Founding Conference of the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) in Belgrade, Serbia, the President of the Republic noted that "Algeria, as it reflects today on the Movement's legacy and its historic positions, affirms that non-alignment is neither a position of the past nor a fleeting diplomatic dream, but rather a renewed sovereign choice dictated by the profound shifts the world is undergoing."

In this regard, President Tebboune emphasized that "the principle of sovereignty is indivisible, and the application of international law cannot be selective," stressing that "respect for international legitimacy cannot be subject to double standards."

Address by the President of the Republic at the high-level meeting commemorating the 65th anniversary of the first founding conference of the Non-Aligned Movement

On Tuesday, the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, delivered an address—read by the President of the National People's Assembly (APN), Ms. Khalida Boufedeché—to the high-level meeting in Belgrade commemorating the 65th anniversary of the first Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) conference.

"In the name of Allah, the Most Gracious, the Most Merciful,

Prayers and peace be upon the noblest of Messengers,

Mr. President,

Excellencies,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I would like, first of all, to express how pleased I am to be among you today, representing the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, at this important event—an event we view as a new impetus for our Movement and an opportunity to renew our commitment to promoting the principles and ideals of non-alignment.

I extend my sincere thanks to the friendly Republic of Serbia—its government and people—for taking the initiative to organize this high-level meeting, as well as for the hospitality and warm welcome extended to us upon our arrival in the historic city of Belgrade.

I also wish to commend the remarkable efforts consistently made by the Ugandan presidency of our Movement, as well as its commitment to steering our activities across various international forums.

Our gathering today to commemorate the 65th anniversary of the first Non-Aligned Movement conference clearly reflects our shared commitment—as member states of this long-standing movement—to the objectives and principles of the Havana Declaration. It also demonstrates our collective determination to strengthen and promote our cooperation and to act as a united, proactive bloc within the international system in order to address various global challenges.

Given the gravity of the current international situation, this meeting offers a valuable opportunity to revitalize the founding principles of our Movement: the primacy of respect for the sovereignty and territorial integrity of states, non-interference in their internal affairs, the protection of mutual interests, and the strengthening of cooperation based on multilateralism—which serves as the primary foundation for achieving the goals set by the Movement's founding

fathers, drawing inspiration from the spirit of the United Nations Charter, the Bandung principles, and the 1961 Belgrade Conference.

These principles hold renewed significance today in the face of a resurgence in the use of force as an alternative to diplomatic good offices for settling international disputes, and the erosion of the legitimacy of international cooperation and the collective security system—stemming from the UN system's persistent inability to halt *fait accompli* policies, prevent the interests of the strong from prevailing over those of the weak, or put an end to selectivity and double standards regarding our common causes.

Algeria, in recalling the Movement's legacy and historic positions today, reaffirms that non-alignment is neither a relic of the past nor a mere fleeting diplomatic dream, but a renewed sovereign choice necessitated by the profound transformations the world is undergoing.

The principle of sovereignty is indivisible, and the application of international law cannot be selective; likewise, respect for international legality cannot be subject to double standards.

The situation in Palestine—characterized by continued aggressive Israeli expansion in the Gaza Strip and the West Bank, grave violations of international and humanitarian law, and the humanitarian catastrophe caused by this large-scale regional war—has a significant negative impact on our Movement's member countries and confronts the international community with a historic responsibility that can no longer be deferred.

This situation compels us to adhere more firmly to our principles as a united and solidary bloc, in order to strengthen our role—as the largest international coalition after the United Nations—in achieving peace and consolidating international security and stability.

Mr. President,

In light of these serious developments, it is legitimate for us to constantly reflect on our collective responsibility and the effectiveness of our contributions to resolving just causes, upholding the voice of the law, and placing international legality above all other considerations—especially given our broad international representation comprising more than 120 states, which makes us an active force and a unique collective voice capable of influencing the course of events on the international stage.

With this in mind, and as a mecca for revolutionaries and a staunch defender of just causes worldwide, Algeria has always stood by liberation movements in Africa, Asia, and Latin America.

It has consistently championed their causes and reaffirmed its commitment to supporting their struggles.

Algeria also contributed to this effort through the call issued by the late President Houari Boumediene—during the Non-Aligned Movement summit held in Algiers in 1973—for the establishment of a new international economic order aimed at freeing the Third World from the yoke of neocolonialism.

In the same spirit, Algeria warmly welcomes our Movement's firm and unwavering commitment to upholding the goals and principles of the United Nations Charter, such as the sovereign equality of states, the peaceful settlement of disputes, and the right of peoples to self-determination.

In conclusion, Mr. President, my country, Algeria, is fully convinced of the righteousness of the noble objectives to which our Movement aspires. It calls for strengthening integration, consultation, and complementarity among the Movement's member states, and for mobilizing all our potential and energy in the service of our common interests, while striving to move forward as a united bloc—master of its own decisions and resolutely committed to a more prosperous and stable future.

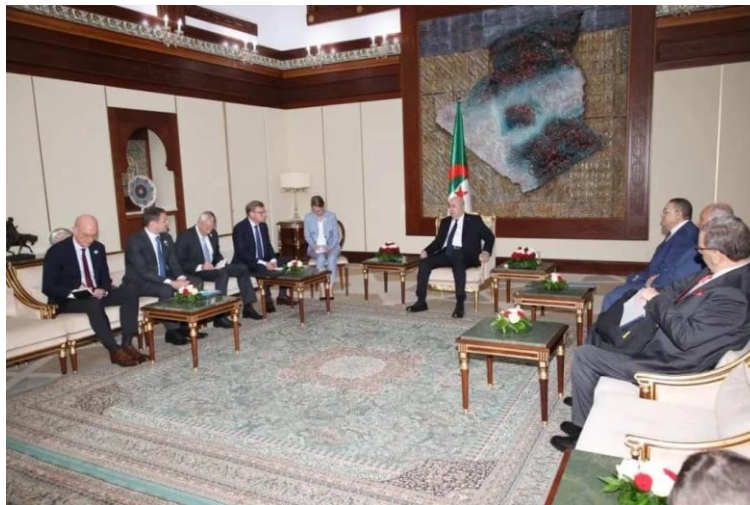

The audience was attended by the Minister of State in charge of the General Inspectorate of State and Local Authorities, Brahim Merad, Minister of State, Minister of Foreign Affairs, National Community Abroad and African Affairs, Ahmed Attaf, Advisor to the President of the Republic in charge of Diplomatic Affairs, Amar Abba, and Algeria's Ambassador to Germany Larbi Latroch.



Germany seeks to bolster ties with Algeria, says FM Wadephul

Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Federal Republic of Germany Johann Wadephul expressed Tuesday his country's keenness to strengthen relations with Algeria and expand bilateral cooperation, particularly in trade, investment, and energy.

In a statement to the press following his meeting with the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, Mr. Wadephul recalled that the President's visit to Berlin last July had provided an opportunity to exchange views on several issues of mutual interest, emphasizing that his presence in Algeria today is part of the "positive momentum" characterizing relations between the two countries.



Referring to the discussions he had with the Minister of State, Minister of Foreign Affairs, National Community Abroad, and African Affairs, Mr. Ahmed Attaf, and the Minister of State, Minister of Hydrocarbons, Mr. Mohamed Arkab, as well as his meeting with representatives of several German companies operating in Algeria, Mr. Wadephul noted the “significant potential that exists for deepening bilateral relations, particularly in the areas of trade, investment, and energy.”

After highlighting German companies’ interest in strengthening their trade ties and investing in Algeria, the German minister addressed the issue of cooperation in the energy sector, noting that Algeria is one of the European Union’s (EU) main gas suppliers.

“Algeria has the assets needed to continue the energy transition process and strengthen its role as a supplier of green hydrogen,” he stated.

On the political front, he noted that regional and international issues had been at the heart of the discussions he held during his visit to Algeria, particularly “the situation in the Sahel region and the challenges facing the Middle East, as well as the Russia-Ukraine war and its repercussions on global food security.”

In light of current geopolitical developments, the German Foreign Minister emphasized “the need to invest in dialogue and mutual consultation, as well as to strengthen cooperation based on trust,” assuring that his country “prioritizes strengthening its relations with partners such as Algeria, both bilaterally and within the framework of the EU.”

At the conclusion of his statement, Mr. Wadephul reiterated his thanks and gratitude to the President of the Republic for the “fruitful exchange of views,” as well as for the warm welcome he received during his visit to Algeria.

He also expressed his country’s solidarity with Algeria—its government and people—in the face of the wildfires that recently affected several regions of the country, offering his sincere condolences to the families of the victims.

Boufedeché holds bilateral talks in Belgrade with her Serbian counterpart



The Speaker of the National People's Assembly, Ms. Khalida Boufedeché, held bilateral talks today, Tuesday, in Belgrade with the Speaker of the National Assembly of the Republic of Serbia, Ms. Ana Brnabić.

The meeting took place on the sidelines of her participation—delegated by the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune—in the high-level meeting commemorating the 65th anniversary of the first conference of Heads of State and Government of the Non-Aligned Movement.

During the talks, the two sides reviewed the state of bilateral relations, "particularly regarding parliamentary cooperation between Algeria and Serbia, as well as the strengthening of consultation and the coordination of positions to serve mutual interests and support dialogue on issues of common concern."

In this context, the Speaker of the Serbian National Assembly commended the level of bilateral relations between the two countries, noting the "determination of their leaderships to strengthen ties across various fields of mutual interest."

Boufedeché holds talks with Azerbaijani Parliament Speaker in Serbia



The president of the National People's Assembly (APN), Ms. Khalida Boufedeché, held bilateral talks on Tuesday in Belgrade, Serbia, with the president of the National Assembly of the Republic of Azerbaijan, Ms. Sahiba Gafarova.

She also emphasized the importance of parliamentary relations between the two countries, particularly through the exchange of visits and expertise between the two legislative bodies and the need to elevate parliamentary cooperation to a level that reflects the depth of the historical and political ties uniting the two countries.

The meeting took place on the sidelines of Ms. Boufedeché's participation, in her capacity as representative of the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, in the high-level meeting commemorating the 65th anniversary of the first Conference of Heads of State and Government of Non-Aligned Countries, being held in Belgrade.

Algeria, represented by the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Combatting of Corruption, is participating in Vienna (Austria) in the 1st resumed 17th session of the Implementation Review Group of the United Nations Convention against Corruption, held from August 31 to September 4 at the headquarters of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime in Vienna, Republic of Austria.

This session comes to continue discussions on "evaluating the performance of the convention's implementation review mechanism, and enhancing the effectiveness of the UN mechanisms concerned with following up on the implementation of its provisions."



Participating as part of the Algerian delegation is an executive from the High Authority, represented by Daoud Ait Hedjam, in addition to representatives from the Ministry of Justice, the Central Office for the Suppression of Corruption, and the General Directorate of National Police.

This participation is part of reaffirming Algeria's commitment to enhancing international cooperation and exchanging expertise and experiences in the field of preventing and combating corruption, and continuing its effective involvement in the UN mechanisms related to the implementation of the United Nations Convention against Corruption.

Mediterranean Games 2026/Artistic gymnastics

Algeria's Kaylia Nemour snatches gold medal



Algerian gymnast Kaylia Nemour won the gold medal in the women's all-around competition on Tuesday during the artistic gymnastics events at the 2026 Mediterranean Games, being held in the Italian city of Taranto through September 3.

Olympic champion Kaylia Nemour finished well ahead of the field in the all-around standings with a total of 57.750 points: vault (13.800), uneven bars (15.650), balance beam (14.700), and floor exercise (13.600).

The silver medal went to Spain's Alba Petisco, who scored 52.850 points, while Italy's Sofia Tonelli took the bronze with a total of 51.650 points.

As for the other Algerian competitor in the event, Djenna Laroui, she finished in 7th place with a score of (50.600 pts).

This marks the fifth gold medal for the Algerian delegation, following those won by Abdelkrim Fergat in Greco-Roman wrestling, Dris Messaoud Redouane in judo, Djamel Sedjati in track and field (800m), and the U-21 soccer team.
